



Introduction

“As an art instructor for thirty years, I am always amazed as I watch what my students create with the tools that I give them. Tangling is one of the most empowering tools I have ever learned or taught.” —Beckah Krahula

Zentangle™, a meditative art form, created by Maria Thomas and Rick Roberts, has spread within a decade to over twenty-three countries. As an instructor who teaches this art form, I have been privileged to witness this amazing art form spread. Many practitioners have learned how to tangle as one person shares this technique with another. I have watched as ordinary people create surprisingly beautiful pieces. Beginners go from timidly picking up their pen to create to confidently expressing themselves with their art. The quick transformation is amazing.

For many, this simple technique of using repetitive strokes to increase focus is a valuable tool they want to share with family or friends, but soon the art they have created on a

meditative tile is the wordless expression they also feel compelled to share. These beautiful abstract drawings that do not come from a preconceived idea, but are a surprisingly organic expression unfolding before the creator’s eyes, attract not only the creator’s eyes but also those of many more.

As you will see in the Zentangled-Inspired Art (ZIA) section of this book, tangers are no different than other creative people. Tanglers eventually start to make this art their own, and tangleations or versions of their own patterns show up spontaneously in all their creative work.

WHAT IS ZENTANGLE?

The incredible artwork in this book was created either as a zentangle or

a zentangle-inspired Artwork, or ZIA. Officially, Zentangle is the word for the method used in which repetitive patterns are drawn to increase awareness and focus. Zentangle can also refer to the completed abstract art created on a finished meditative tile. The repetitive patterns, not meant to represent anything specific, are drawn on the tiles and are called *tangles*. Drawing tangles is called *tangling*, and those that draw tangles are called *tangers*. No previous art skills are needed to tangle. In Zentangle you simply cannot fail or make a mistake. If the pattern is drawn differently than the intended tangle, you have created a tangleation of that tangle, not a mistake!





Tangles are made from a pattern that can be broken down into very few strokes and easily repeated. They are given a name so tangers can easily describe the pattern they are using. At right are four official tangle patterns that have been stepped out.

FOUR OFFICIAL TANGLE PATTERNS STEPPED OUT



All tangles break down to just these five strokes.


All that is needed to tangle is a drawing pen, pencil, and a $3\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{2}$ -inch [9 x 9 cm] piece of paper, which is used to tangle on and is called a *tile*. To start tangling, first gather the pen, pencil, sketchbook, or extra sheet of paper, and tile.

1. Relax, stretch a little, and make yourself comfortable. Use the drawing pen to practice the tangles in a sketchbook. Notice the last step on each shows how to use the pencil to add some shading to that tangle. When they become familiar, you are ready to start the tile. Set your sketchbook aside and pick up your tile.

2. Use the pencil to create a light dot in each corner. Just place them where it feels right. Draw a line connecting the dots to create a border. Do not worry about drawing straight; the eye finds curved lines more interesting.

3. Spontaneously use the pencil to divide the area inside the border into four or five areas. Tanglers call this *creating the string*.

4. Pick up the tile, holding it at arm's length, and examine it in all four directions. Decide which section you want to tangle first. Using the pen, fill that area with the tangle while focusing on where you are drawing with the pen.




The spontaneity of the string insures no two pieces of art look alike.


5. Continue step four until all the sections of the tile are filled in. Recap the pen and use the pencil to shade the tangles.

6. Using the pen, initial the front of your tile and sign and date your tile on the back.

This tile was created using the four patterns shown. It is not necessary to fill every section of the string. The choice is yours.

The Art of the Meditative Tile

AZentangled tile is created spontaneously and always on a 3½-inch [9 cm] square piece of drawing paper in an achromatic [black, white, and grey] color scheme. These abstract pieces of art unfold before the creator's eyes one stroke at a time. Although many use the same tangles, the art on each tile is as unique as each artist that creates one.
